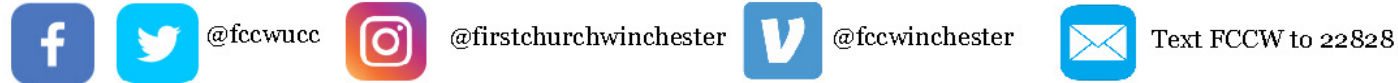

Lenten Worship Series: 7 Last Words of Jesus from The Cross

During the 6 Sundays of Lent this year leading up to Holy Week and Easter, our worship services will be centered upon the 7 Last Words of Jesus from the cross. Our tradition, from the very forming of the Gospels, has always held these last "words" (phrases or sayings) he spoke before his death as especially sacred. The 7 Words, including "Father forgive them for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34) and "Woman here is your son... Son, here is your mother" (John 19:26) among others, are spread across the four Gospels and reveal the very human anguish that links him in a profound way to the sorrows and struggles of our own lives. At some point in the Middle Ages the words were ordered as they stand now and services were held – often during Holy Week - to invite worshippers to reflect upon the words and through them how Jesus speaks into their own lives. During our Lenten worship services starting Sunday, March 1st, we'll engage each of the 7 Words through prayers, sermons and our music. Each week, to further illuminate the 7 Words, the choir, along with the esteemed Aryaloka String Quartet and organ, will offer a corresponding movement from Joseph Haydn's profound masterpiece, *The Seven Last Words*. The work serves as a meditation on the gravity of tragedy, as well as on the promise of redemption. Our hope is that this worship series will open you to the compassionate heart of Jesus as you move through the reflective season of Lent and prepare you for the joyful celebration of Easter.

Music Notes

Each week, the FCC Choir will provide a movement of Haydn's dramatic and moving oratorio, *Die sieben letzten Worte des Erlösers am Kreuze* (The Seven Last Words of Our Savior on the Cross), Hob.XX:2. Originally composed as an orchestral work in 1786, Haydn subsequently made a string quartet arrangement, solo keyboard version and, finally, an oratorio for vocal soloists, chorus, and orchestra. To begin each movement or "word," you will hear a short chorale-like episode (in German, corresponding to the text of the 7 last words), written in traditional chant style, with no meter or rhythm. We have placed the "chant" before the sermon. The movement offered immediately following the sermon is Haydn's own anguished reflection on the corresponding "word" or "sentence." We are blessed to welcome the Aryaloka String Quartet to our chancel each week during Lent: Beth Welty, violin; Mark Latham, violin; Noralee Walker, viola; Joel Wolfe, guest cellist. With our own Jeffrey Mead at the organ, we have an opportunity to meaningfully and prayerfully explore these beautiful 7 last words.

News & Upcoming Events

11th Hour in Ripley, TODAY - Safe Communities Act Presentation

We will be reading *On the Brink of Just About Everything: Grace, Gravity and Getting Old* by Parker Palmer. Our plan is to complete the book by Holy Week. We plan to conclude each Tuesday by 8:00 p.m.

The setting for "The Open Door of Blessing" is the beautiful Ripley Chapel at First Congregational Church. Faith Formation News

Stepping Stones

This week, the children will be reading two parables that Jesus taught, the Lost Sheep and the Lost Coin. It teaches us that no matter who we are God cares about each one of us individually. Here are some conversation starters for this week:

1. How do you feel when you've lost something?
2. What are your best tips for finding lost things?
3. How do you know God loves each and every one of us?
4. Take turns telling about a time when you were lost. What did you do? Talk about what the best things to do in such a situation are.

As a fun activity to do this week...engage your children in a fun game of hide and seek!

Middle School

The students will be reading Luke 14:25-35 for a lesson entitled "The Cost of Discipleship". This lesson will help teach students the difference between cheap and costly discipleship. Cheap discipleship is about following Jesus for what we can get out of it. Costly discipleship (true discipleship) is about recognizing that following Jesus won't always be easy, but it will always be worth it because Jesus is the only one worth following. Students will also think about how they can start preparing for potential difficulties they'll encounter on the road of discipleship.

Ask your middle school youth the following:

1. Does anything about following Jesus make you excited? Nervous?
2. What's one thing you might have to sacrifice to follow Jesus?

Rites of Passage Ceremony-June 7th

This year we are starting a new tradition with our 8th graders which is based loosely off of the old Rite 13 Ceremony we have had in years past. On June 7th, during the worship service, the church and their parents will bless each individual 8th grade student as they prepare to move on to high school. Forum

This week's lesson is called "Jesus treats the least as family" and it comes from Mark 5:21-34. It is about hospitality. Some say it's a spiritual gift that certain people are wired with, while the rest of us are free to focus on other things. When Jesus lived on earth, he extended hospitality to those around him, welcoming them into his presence with warmth and kindness. And he made a point to include the least. As Christ-followers who seek to do the things that Jesus did, we can extend hospitality because God welcomed and loved us first. Take some time to talk to your teens about how you can make your house more welcoming to different people? What would be the most welcoming and why to those people: Your friends, the coolest kid at school, your Sunday School teacher, the most awkward student/teacher at school, the last homeless person you saw, the President of the United States.

Repair Café

The Environmental Ministry committee is excited to announce that it will be moving forward in developing a Repair Cafe. Having been started in the Netherlands, the Repair Café Foundation has the following goals: a) To bring repairing back into local society in a modern way. b) To maintain repair expertise and spread this knowledge. c) To promote social cohesion in the local community by bringing people together from different backgrounds – while benefitting the larger environment too.

A special thank you to Karen Bellacosa, whose investigative work has demonstrated the viability of such an initiative. Given the enthusiastic response at Sunday's meeting, FCC has committed to holding a Repair Cafe this coming October. It is our hope and prayer that interest will continue to build - thereby establishing a coalition base made up of other Winchester churches and organizations.

There are currently Repair Cafés operating successfully in the northeast including Salem, Framingham and Newburyport, MA. Melrose is working towards starting one also. We will keep you posted on this exciting development.
